# COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course presents a broad introduction to the area of abnormal psychology. Topics include: the definition of abnormal behaviour; the diagnostic features, etiology, prevalence, and treatment of various disorders; and abnormal psychology and societal issues.

# **Delivery format**

2 lectures (3 hours each). You will also need to allocate 2-3 hours every week for the completion of learning activities and the assignment. This does not include additional reading that should be planned according to your own convenience. It is important to note that the time required for successful course completion will vary for each student.
